The Book of Lamentations

According to the local newspapers, a Felmingham farmer recently said that it has been a challenging growing season for crops. It began with ceaseless rain in autumn and winter, meaning that many crops struggled to establish their roots. This was followed by a prolonged dry spell in spring — including East Anglia's driest May on record — and a heatwave in the summer. It meant that by the autumn wheat yields were down by 15%. Winter barley and winter oilseed rape were down 20% on five-year averages. On top of all our concerns over the pandemic, climate change and Brexit, this has not been a good harvest year.

It also looks at the time of writing that there will be no Harvest Festival service in Gunton this October — perhaps for the first time in centuries. The word 'lamentations' comes to mind. In the Old Testament there is a book with the same name. The Church of England, usually refers to those readings during Holy Week, but now they seem to have a more universal relevance.

This 'Book of Lamentations' recalls the siege and eventual destruction of Jerusalem by the Babylonians in 596 BC. Its population endured horrible deprivation (Lamentations 4:4, 5, 9). The Temple was destroyed and the city's population was marched across the Middle East into captivity. It was a disaster of epic proportions which challenged the prophet Jeremiah to ask where was *Yahweh*, the God of Israel in all that. Jeremiah (650s – c570 BC) the 'weeping prophet' also wrote the preceding Book which was named after him. He was described in much detail emphasising his importance in Jewish history and also to us.

Beginning with the reality of disaster, Lamentations concludes with the bitter realisation that the Jews had broken the Covenant which Abraham made with *Yahweh*, so they feared that they had been finally rejected (Chapter 5:22). The prophet acknowledged that their suffering was a just punishment, but they knew that *Yahweh* had a choice over whether to act in that way and at that time. Hope arose from the recollection of His past goodness which justified a cry to God to deliver His people but they were not confident that He would. It was felt that repentance might not persuade God to be gracious, since He is free to give or withhold grace as He chooses. Nevertheless, it also acknowledged that the mercies of *Yahweh* never end and are renewed every morning (3:22–33).

Towards the end of his ministry, Jesus also lamented the lack of faith in his people knowing that there would be those who would be bent on his destruction when he would have to make the ultimate sacrifice (Luke 13:31, 33 and 34; 19: 41-44);

`Jerusalem, you that kill the prophets and stone those sent to you. How long have I longed to gather together my children . . . yet you stand in my way. So be it. You can keep your Temple. I promise you shall not see me till the time comes when you say, blessings on him who comes in the name of the Lord'.

Despite all that, he left us with a New Covenant (John 14:6) – where Jesus said. '*I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me'*. In that, we can hold on to eternal hope.
